

MANAGING A NEEDLESTICK INJURY



Stay calm

- > Allow the wound to bleed freely
- > Immediately wash the area with running water and soap, rinse and pat dry
- > Cover with a band-aid or dry dressing
- > As soon as possible contact your:
 - Supervisor
 - Local doctor
 - Hospital
 - Community Health Centre

WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND USED SYRINGES



If you feel confident you can follow these steps:

- > Do NOT handle the syringe
- > Do not try to break off, bend or cover the sharp end
- > Find a rigid-walled, puncture-resistant container, ideally with a wide mouth and a secure lid
- > Avoid carrying the syringe – bring the container to the syringe
- > Do not hold the container, place on ground next to syringe
- > Use protective gloves or tongs if available and carefully pick up the syringe away from the sharp end
- > Place the syringe in the container sharp end first
- > If available, securely place lid on the container
- > Wash hands with running water and soap
